Room 300 - Archives Reading Room, Reference, Genealogy temporarily closed April 13-15 & 20-22

AUSTIN, Texas – The Texas State Library and Archives Commission will temporarily close Room 300 of the Lorenzo de Zavala State Archives and Library Building, from April 13-15 and April 20-22.

All Archives & Information Services staff members are needed to move over 8,000 cubic feet of materials and 12,000 linear feet of publications, in a limited amount of time, as the continuation of the \$15.5 million renovation to the Lorenzo de Zavala building is advancing to the upper floors.

Room 300 service areas include the Archives Reading Room, Reference, and Genealogy. Room 300 will reopen and resume service at 8 a.m., on Thursday, April 16 and again on April 23.

“The enormity of the task requires every staff member that we have to make it go as quickly as possible and to ensure the safety and security of the archival materials,” said Peggy D. Rudd, Texas State Library and Archives Commission director and librarian.
